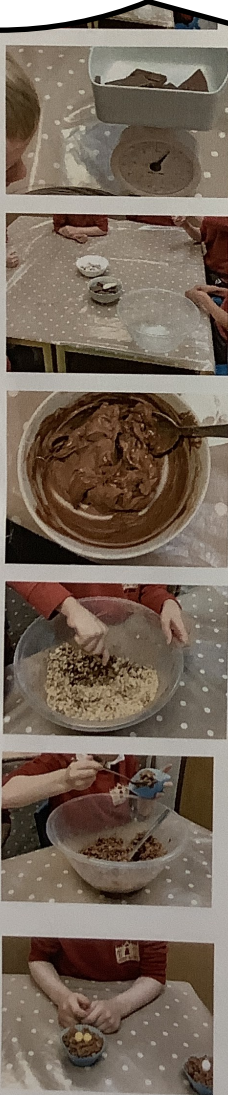


Foundation Stage

ingredients.

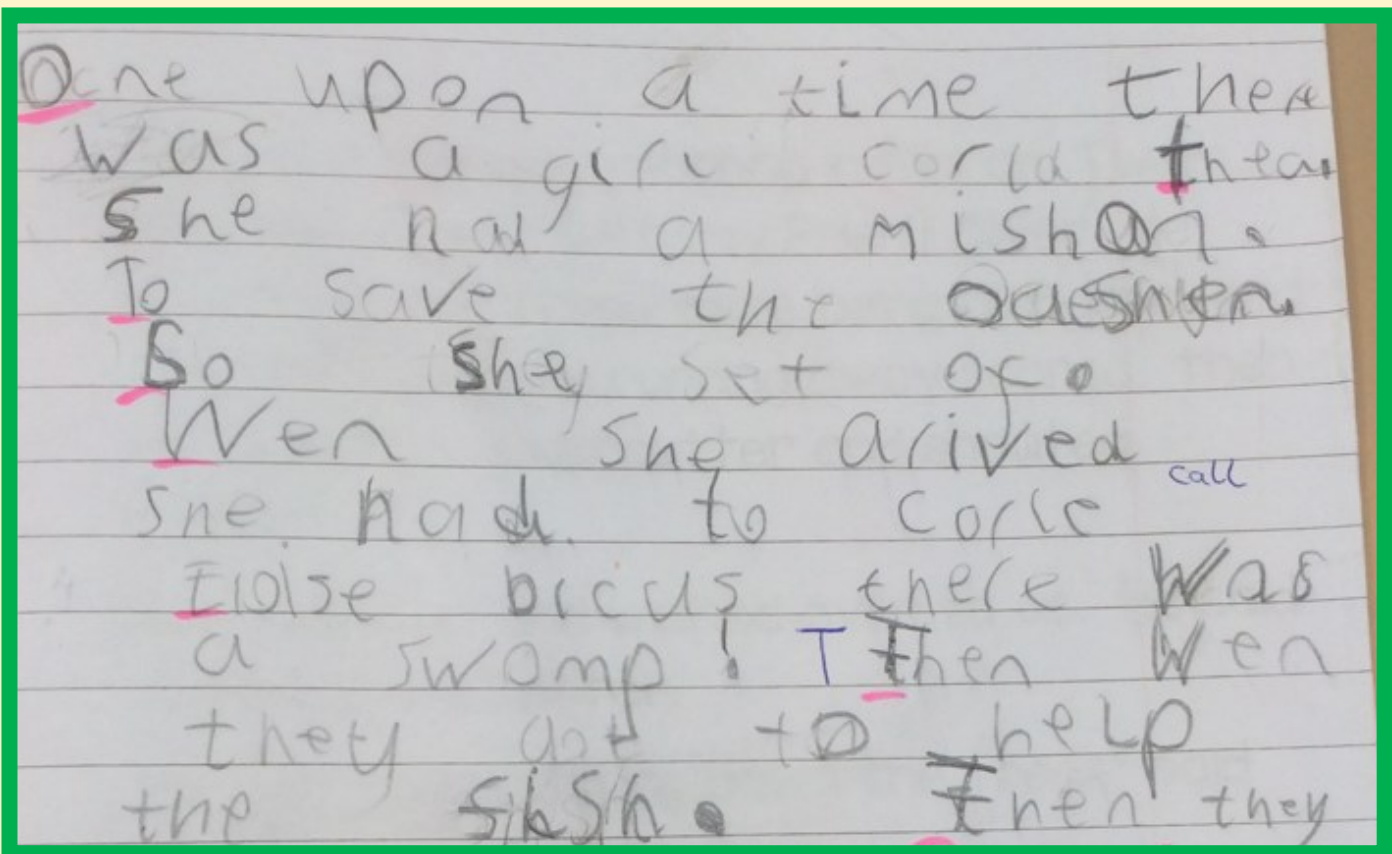

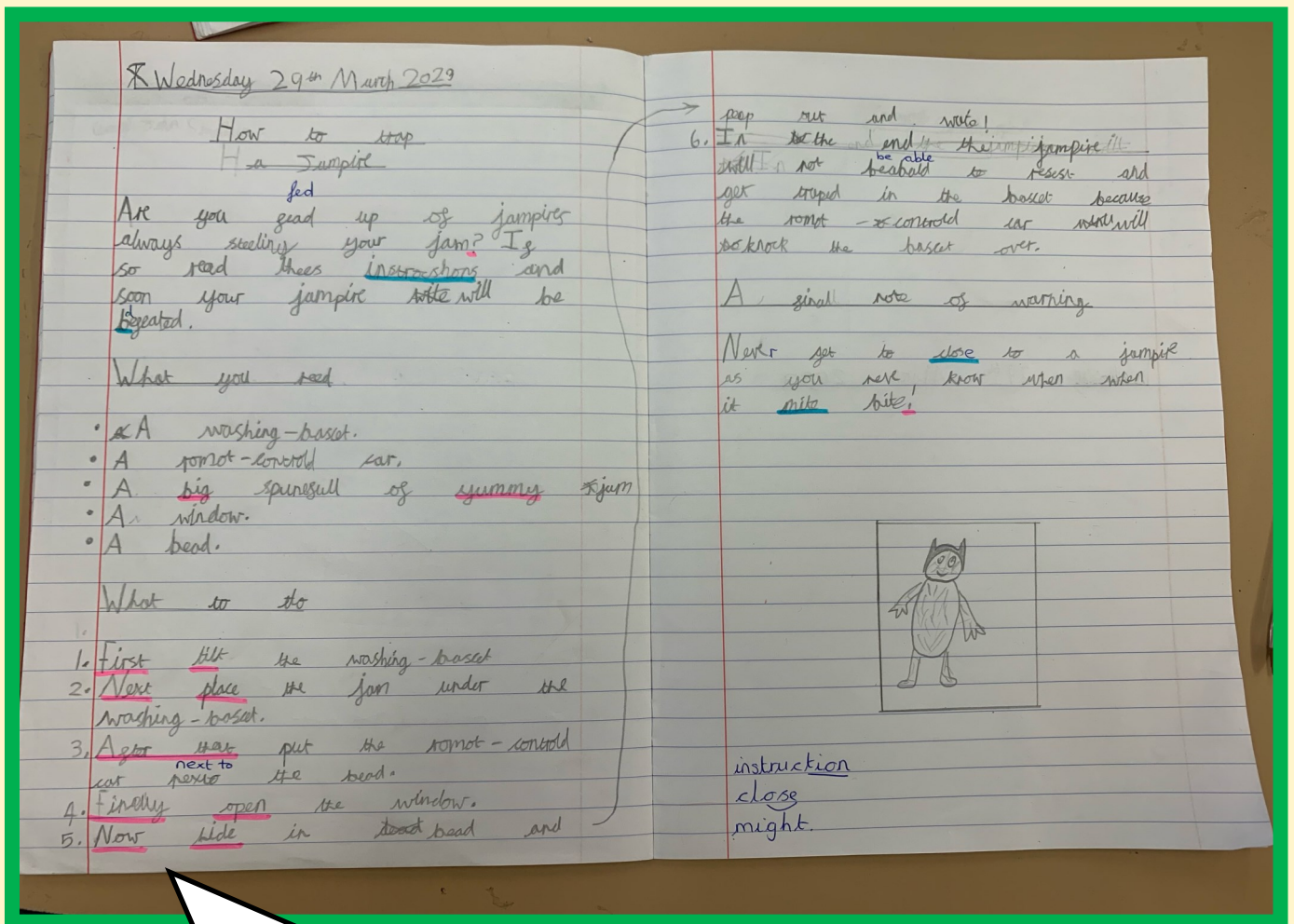


Year 2

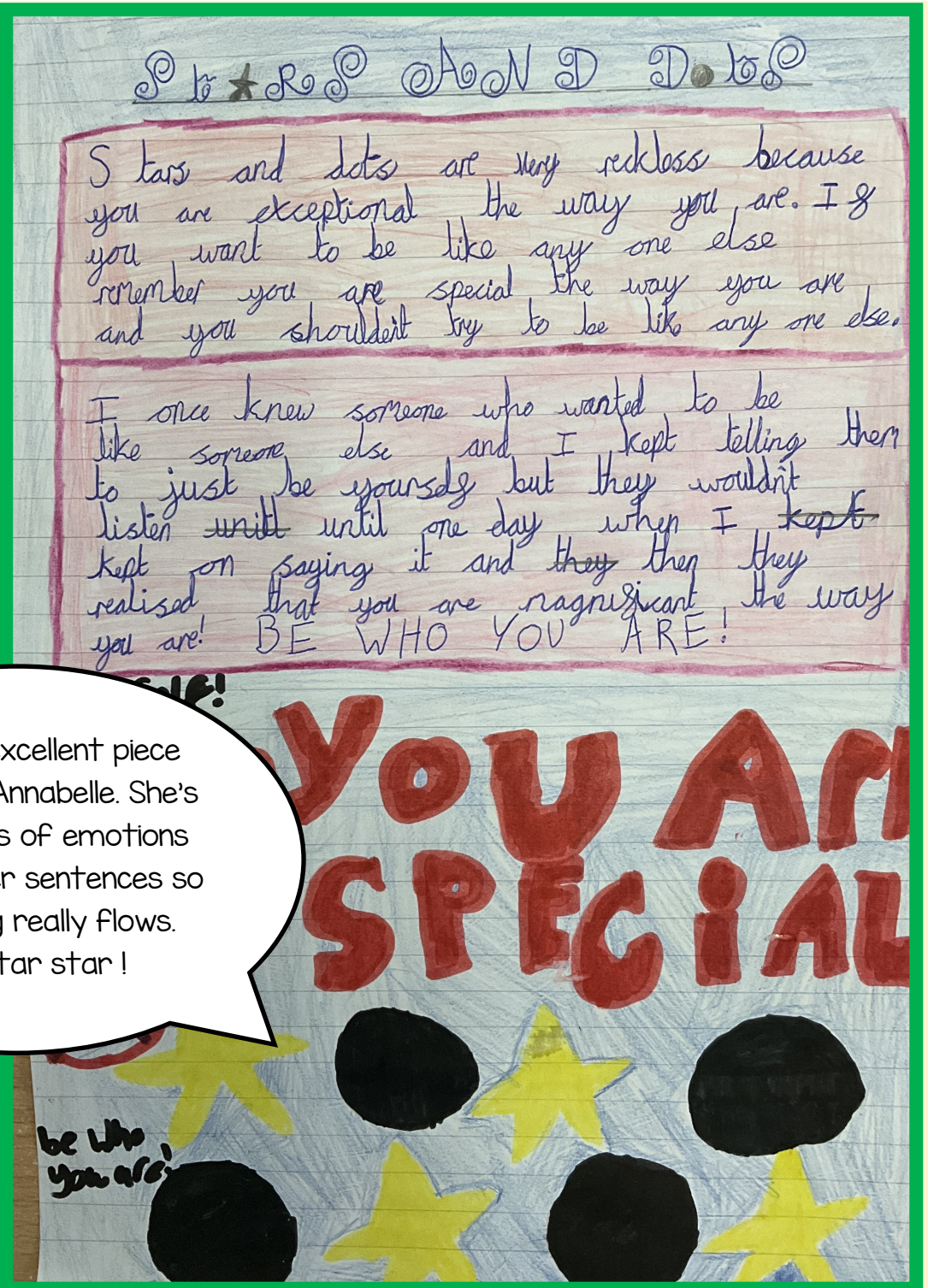

Patsy has included a range of fronted adverbials including time conjunctions.

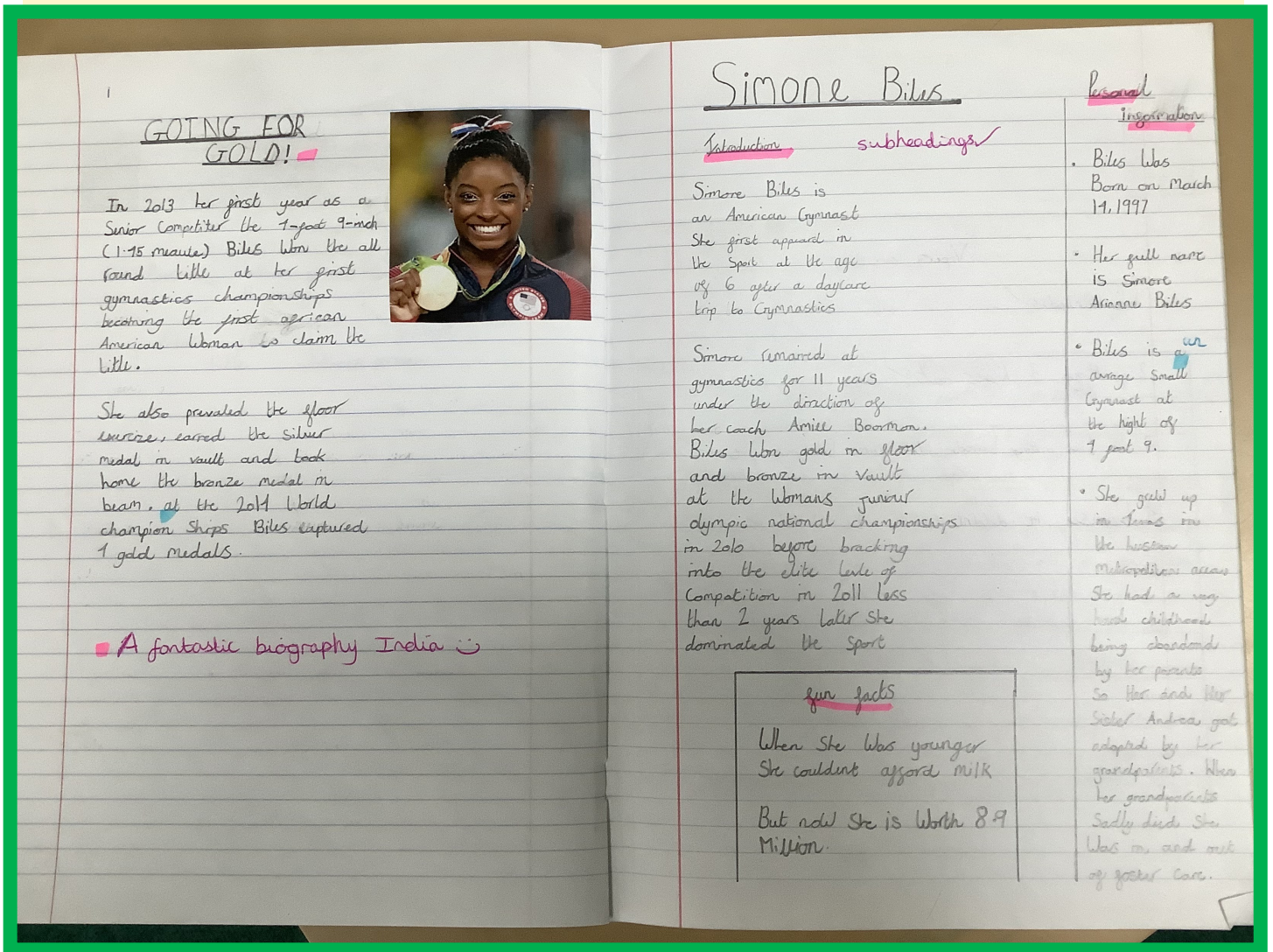

GOING FOR GOLD!

In 2013 her first year as a Senior Competitor the 1-foot 9-inch (1.75 metre) Biles won the all round title at her first gymnastics championships becoming the first African American woman to claim the title.



She also prevailed the floor exercise, earned the silver medal in vault and took home the bronze medal in beam, at the 2014 World Championships Biles captured 1 gold medals.

Simone Biles is an American Gymnast She first appeared in the sport at the age of 6 after a daycare trip to Gymnastics

Simone remained at gymnastics for 11 years under the direction of her coach Arniele Boorman. Biles won gold in floor and bronze in vault at the women's junior olympic national championships in 2016 before breaking into the elite level of competition in 2017 less than 2 years later she dominated the sport

Biles is an average small gymnast at the height of 1 foot 9.

The Flying Tino

Pandora is a world of wonder and beauty, Pandora is a moon located in a solar system 4.4 light years from Earth. It's a home to a wide variety of animals including the Flying Tino. Every creature on Pandora is very unique some are able to fly, some have razor sharp claws and some have long tongues.

What does The Flying Tino look like?

The extraordinary creature has long wings and a short body to help it glide along smoothly. They are similar to the land Tino but they are more deadly (thanks to their strong wings). These creatures have a stinger on their forehead as sharp as a needle to eliminate their prey. Their scaly body acts as an armour for them, when they land on the ground in an aggressive manner.

The Flying Tino's habitat.

The Flying Tino roams the Skys of Pandora. They barely spend any time on land because their small size poses a threat to being eaten whole by other creatures. They are carnivores like many other species on Pandora. Even though they are small they eat huge creatures, like Diashores and thickskinned hammerheads. They glide down above their prey and stab their chest with their stinger the prey slowly dies from the poison and The Flying Tino digs their razor sharp teeth into their skin.

Did you know?

- Their wings change colour over time, when they are newborn their wings are green, when they grow up their wings turn black and when they are old they turn dark blue.
- Tinos can live for up to 1000 years and still be able to fly properly.
- Every year their stinger gets sharper and sharper so if you get spotted by an old Tino it will be disastrous!
