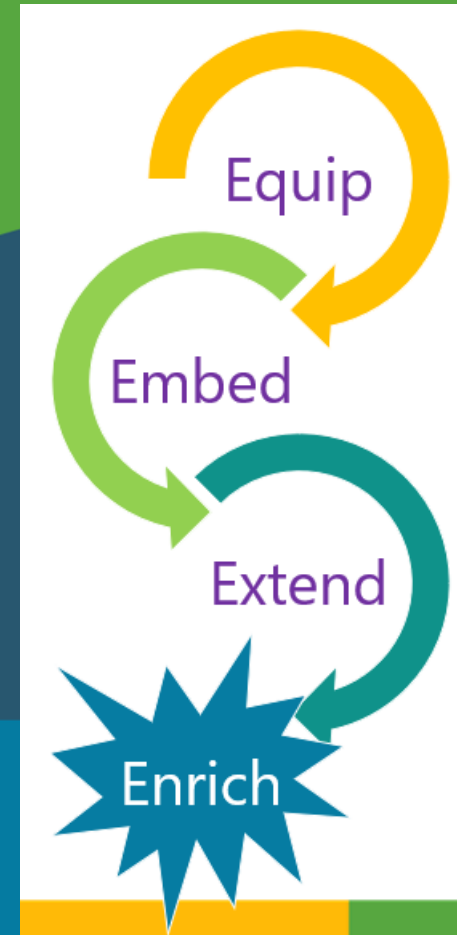
Learning together

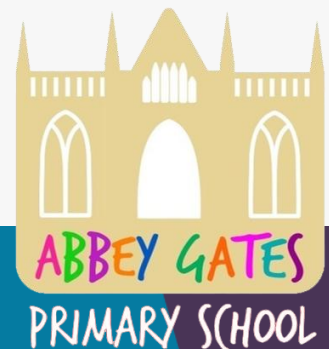

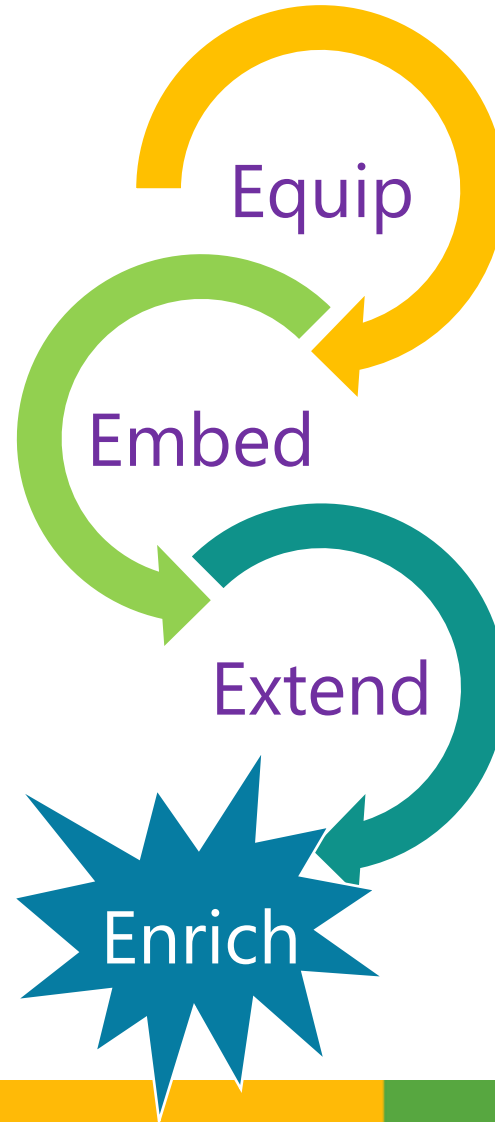


Our Vision for Excellence

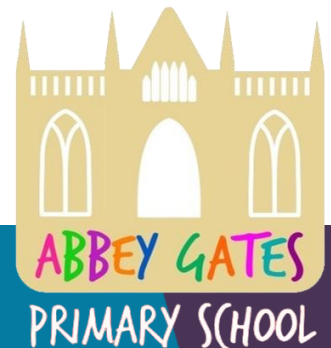

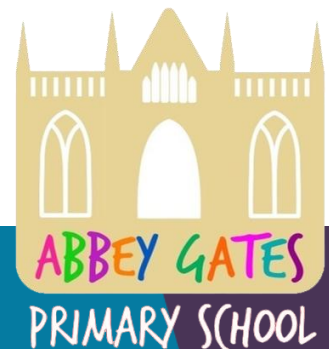

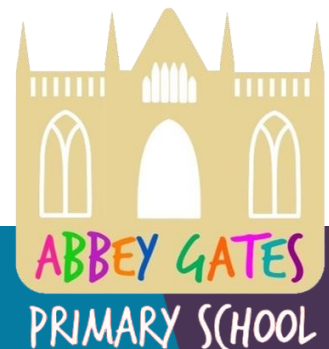
Educational Offer

Organisation of Learning – Foundation Stage

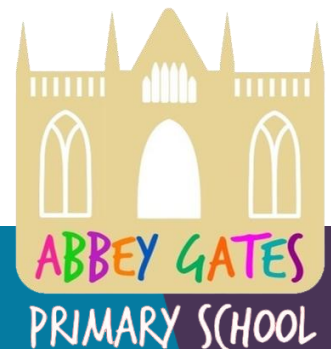
Getting it right from the start

Our youngest children, aged 3-5 years, are taught in the Foundation Stage Unit, which comprises two spacious indoor and outdoor learning areas.

Staff in the Foundation Unit work very closely together, planning a curriculum based on Development Matters where children learn through child-led and structured play, taking full account of their individual needs. It is here that we aim to embed the characteristics of learning to ensure that we are unlocking a life-long love of learning.

In the Foundation Stage we foster a love of reading, and the children build on their home reading with a focus on phonics acquisition. Our bespoke Synthetic Phonics Program has a proven track record of high results focusing on listening and attention in F1 through to preparation for the phonics screening in Year 1. Importantly, we often find children in our reading areas, enjoying books with their friends!

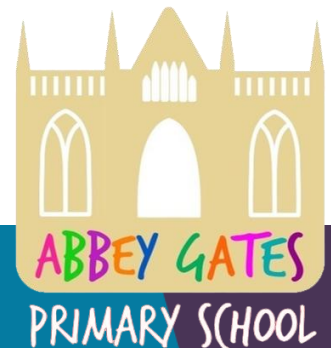
Organisation of Learning – Key Stage 1

Building on strong foundations

Our younger children, aged 5-7 years, are taught in Key Stage 1, which follows on from our Foundation Unit provision. Our school leaders ensure that transition to Year 1 is smooth as the children begin the National Curriculum areas of learning.

Children are taught in single age mixed ability classes throughout the school. Work is adjusted according to the needs of the children. Children in KS1 may be taught in smaller target groups in English and maths. Classes vary in size with an average of 30 pupils. Children will spend the majority of their time with their class teacher, but many activities are arranged to encourage inter-relationships between the age groups and classes. Our staff have curriculum specialisms and so some subjects, such as Forest Schools and PE, may be taught by our specialist staff in mixed year group sessions. Children, parents and staff love the family feel at Abbey Gates which helps everyone to feel a strong sense of belonging.

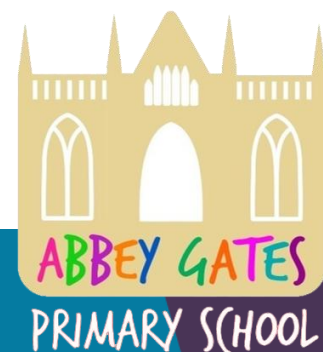
Organisation of Learning – Key Stage 2

Our older children, aged 7-11 years, are taught in Key Stage 2, which follows on from our KS1 provision. Leaders ensure that transition into Key Stage 2 is smooth as the children continue the National Curriculum areas of learning, making links to what has come before.

Learning activities take place according to the needs of the children. Children will spend most of their time with their class teacher, but many activities are arranged to encourage relationships between age groups and classes. We have staff with curriculum specialisms and so some subjects may be taught by our specialist staff. These include French, Forest Schools, PE and Music. The school takes great pride in encouraging musical, sporting and artistic talent and in providing opportunities to develop and share these talents in and out of school.

As well as ensuring the completion of homework tasks which include creative projects and on-line learning, parents are expected and encouraged to support their children's learning through nightly reading at home and helping children to learn spellings and times - tables.

Quality time is invested in preparing the children for secondary school and beyond.

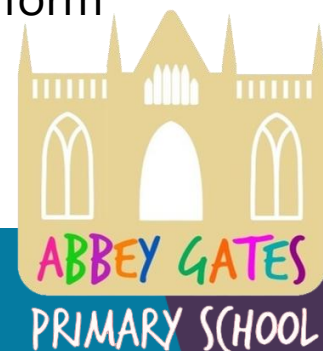
School Admissions & 15/30 hours

We offer Foundation 1 (F1 / Nursery) provision before children start statutory full-time schooling. Children may attend F1 during the term following their 3rd birthday.

When does your child turn 3?	When can they attend Abbey Gates?	
1 st April – 31 st August	Autumn term	September
1 st September – 31 st December	Spring term	January
1 st January – 31 st March	Summer term	April

Families that receive 15 hours of funded childcare can pay for additional hours where available, at a cost of £5.00 per hour.

Abbey Gates also offers up to 30 hours of funded childcare for eligible families. These hours can be shared with other childcare providers. Parents should state their preference for sessions on the form provided by the school office and sessions will be allocated where possible.



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Admissions Criteria

Children will be admitted to full-time school (F2) at the beginning of the autumn term. Children with birthdays between 1st September – 31st August will be admitted on the first day of the autumn term.

All admissions to F2 are the responsibility of Nottinghamshire County Council. In the event of oversubscription, the following criteria will be applied by them, in priority order, to determine which applications will be granted once places have first been allocated to pupils who have an EHCP which names the school.

1. Children looked after by a local authority
2. Children who live in the catchment area at the closing date for applications and who, at the time of admission, will have a brother or sister attending the school or the linked junior/primary school
3. Other children who live in the catchment area at the closing date for applications
4. Children who live outside the catchment area

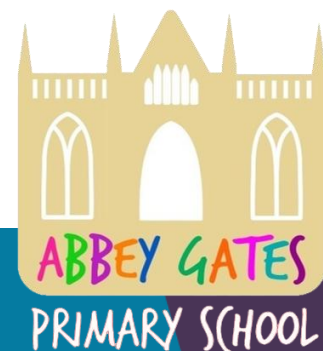

Special Educational Needs

We endeavour to meet the needs of all learners by identifying their individual learning needs and the setting and sharing of targets with the children and parents. We work alongside outside agencies such as Speech and Language Therapists, Educational Psychologists, the Healthy Families Team, the School Nursing service, Physiotherapists, Dieticians and other professionals.

Experienced and well qualified Teaching Assistants work with individuals and groups of children of all abilities. Our local family of schools, all have SENCOs (Special Educational Needs Coordinators) who work collaboratively throughout the year, meeting at least once a term. In addition to this, they also meet at Springboard meetings where local authority resources are allocated termly.

Copies of our policies relating to SEND and Equality and the Local Offer are available on the website. The Local Offer brings together information across education, health, social care and the voluntary and independent sectors and is designed specifically for children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities and their families. 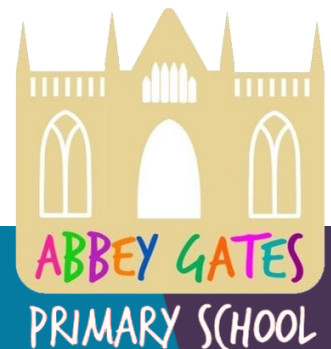
Timings of the school day

The school day runs from 8.50am to 3.25pm. The morning session is from 8.50am to 12.00 noon (EYFS go into the hall for lunch from 11.50am), and the afternoon session is set from 12.50pm to 3.25pm.

Lunchtimes

Our midday staff are trained playworkers and have a wide range of activities and games available – we have worked closely with the Pupil Parliament to ensure safe, happy and active playtimes. We work tirelessly to ensure that *'Every child has amazing play, every day'* and received the Platinum Award for OPAL Play which the children have reinvented as 'FUNBURST' time.

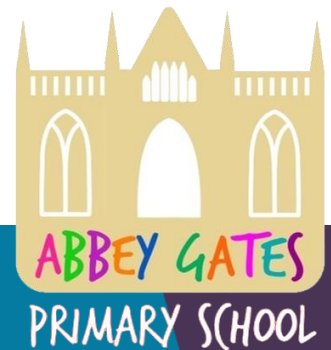
Food and drink

During the lunchtime break a choice of meals, freshly cooked on the premises, are served in the dining area. Children may wish to bring a packed lunch. School dinners are provided for free for children from F2 to Y2, in line with the national incentive.

Dinner money for children in years 3-6 is paid through the online School Gateway system. Details are available from the school office. The menu is available in advance on our website or on school notice boards.

Children are encouraged to bring in a sealable, named drinking bottle which can be replenished. Children may bring a healthy snack to eat at break times. We encourage children to eat healthily, and fruit is provided free to children in FS and KS1.

Pupil Parliament worked with the kitchen staff to provide break time snacks for Key Stage 2. These include foods such as Pizza Muffins and Crumpets. Further information will be available from the office as we work with the new Parliament to provide what they want.



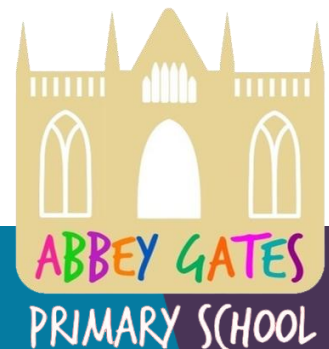
School Uniform – Please name all items!!!

Children in school are expected to wear the uniform which is a source of pride and community identity. Items with the school logo are available. ***Please note logo branded items are not compulsory.***

- grey skirt/trousers /pinafore/shorts
- white blouse/shirt/polo shirt
- red and white summer dress
- red sweatshirt/cardigan/fleece
- appropriate shoes (plain black trainers are acceptable but they should not be coloured or branded)
- wellies or a change of shoes for playtimes as we go out whatever the weather!

PE kits

- white/red T-shirt (plain with no logos other than the school badge if desired)
- white or black shorts
- full swimming costume/trunks (not baggy shorts) when swimming
- tracksuit (or similar) and trainers are required for outdoor sessions
- jewellery should not be worn during any PE activity. For health and safety reasons children will not be allowed to take part in PE sessions if jewellery is worn.

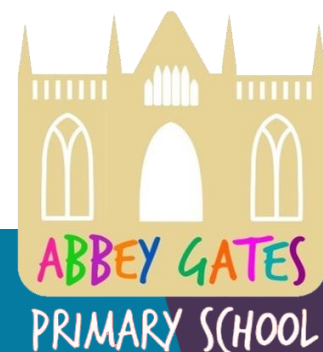
Medical Care

Where a medical appointment is made, or when an emergency occurs, parents are expected to contact the school to arrange collection of the children. No child will be allowed to leave the school premises during normal school hours unless collected by a parent or an authorised adult. Parents are required to sign the appointments register in the school office when collecting their children whether during class time or break/lunchtimes.

Teachers will not routinely administer medicine. Only prescribed medicines can be administered, when accompanied by a completed permission form. These are available at the school office. We need to be aware of allergies and other health issues- do keep us informed.

Before your child starts school, you will need to complete the necessary contacts and medical information sheets and hand these to the school office.

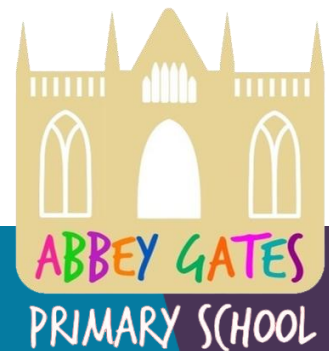
Attendance Matters

When absences occur, either for whole or part days, parents have a responsibility to contact the school confirming the reason for absence. Holidays should not be taken during term time and will not be authorised, unless in exceptional circumstances and may be subject to a fine. Requests for a 'Withdrawal From Learning Form' can be made to the school office. Fines are issued by the Local Authority - per pupil, per parent.

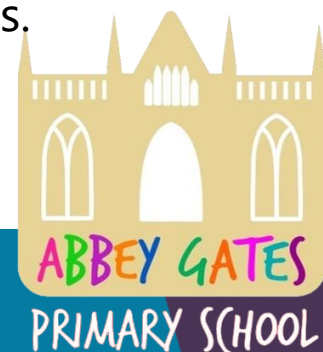
Relationships & Behaviour

The care and welfare of the children is 'the cornerstone of our operation' and we firmly believe that good relationships and teamwork are at the heart of a successful school. Children are expected to behave in a respectful, sensible and orderly way in school, when representing the school, and in the community.

Abbey Gates has a Relationships Policy which defines the culture that we aim for and the way in which we work to achieve this. We are trauma informed practitioners with a wealth of experience and training. We believe that children learn best in an atmosphere of mutual trust, respect and understanding and our policy reflects our belief in celebrating the positive whilst recognising that we all have rights and responsibilities.

Here children learn about their emotions and relationships with others with an explicitly taught curriculum to help them find their way. We use the Zones of Regulation to support children to navigate their feelings, and a text-based approach 'Talking Points' to learn even more about relationships.

The school has established links, both formal and informal, with other bodies and institutions concerned with care, welfare, health and safety of children.



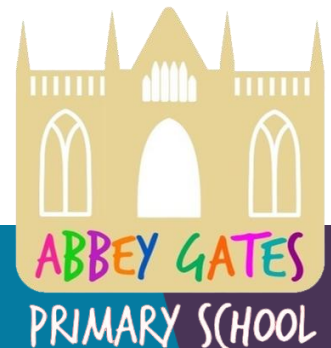

Safeguarding

Every school in Nottinghamshire is required to follow a set procedure in cases of suspected child abuse. Headteachers have a statutory obligation to refer their concerns to Social Care for further investigation so that children at risk can be identified quickly. This procedure is intended to protect children from abuse. When a school refers concern to the Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH), it is not accusing parents of any abuse but requesting that further investigation take place to establish whether the child is at risk. All staff have been trained in safeguarding policies and procedures, and our Designated Safeguarding Leads are shown on the following page.

The school has a policy on relationships and sex education that involves the health community, parents and teachers. Children are taught at an age-appropriate level as they progress through the school. Films concerning puberty are shown in years 4, 5 and 6 and it is normal practice for parents to be given an opportunity to view the material used prior to its showing to the children and they may request that their child be withdrawn from these sessions.

The above policies and practices are implemented for the welfare of the children but not to the exclusion of parents and family. Parents are fully informed of all care, welfare and safety advice given to the children and parental support is always sought.

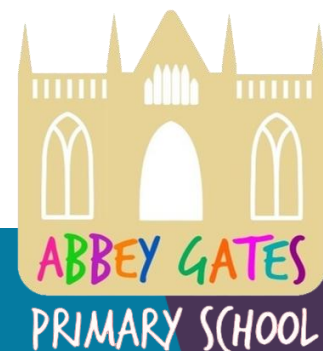

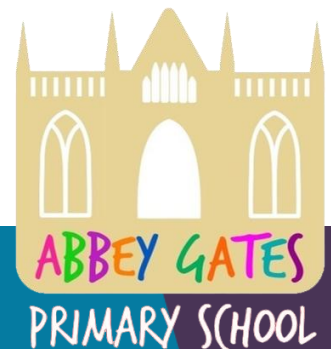
Religious Education

Parent/Teacher, Visiting and Reporting

We have two Parent/Teacher Meetings (Learning Reviews) per year, and a written report is sent towards the end of the summer term. However, should any concern arise, parents are encouraged to arrange a discussion with the class teacher at a convenient time.

Guidance permitting, parents are always welcome to visit the school, but it would be helpful if contact could be made in advance to arrange a mutually convenient appointment, although in emergency immediate contact should be made.

Community involvement is the essential lifeblood of Abbey Gates, and many parents contribute to the working of the school by bringing their skills, interest and time to the benefit of the children, whether on a regular or one-off basis. Regular parent helpers are subject to a DBS check.

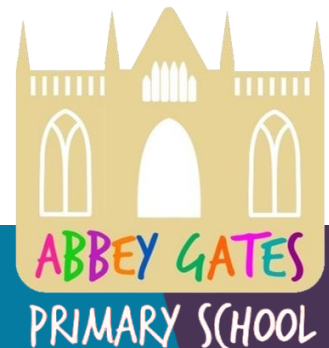
Complaints

Under the Education Act, there is a procedure, agreed by the Local Authority, for dealing with complaints about the school curriculum and other related issues. A copy of the full complaints procedure is available for reference in the school and on the website.

Essentially, there should normally be informal discussion with the Headteacher and any other appropriate member of the teaching staff to attempt resolution to the complaint prior to recourse to the formal procedure. Thereafter, the procedure provides an opportunity for parents to write to the Governor responsible for complaints, who can be contacted through the school.

In addition, the public have the right of access to documents and information under the Education Regulations 1989, and a list of such information is available in the school and on our website. Parents are encouraged to make use of this requirement to inform themselves of the objectives and workings of the school.

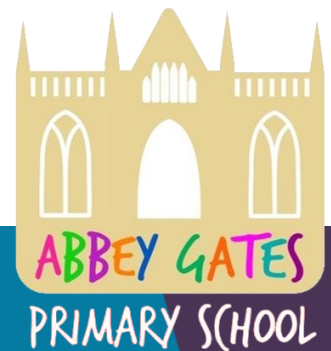
Governors

Governors act as 'critical friends' to the Headteacher and the school. They bring a wealth of skills and experience across a wide variety of areas linked to school life.

Governors are available to talk to parents about any aspect of the school, and we hold informal sessions where parents are invited to meet and chat informally with Mrs Quant-Epps and the Governors. Governors are also available to meet with parents at the school where possible, during Parents/Teacher Meetings.

The Governing Body would emphasise that all matters relating to individual children's education and other matters, should in the first instance, be discussed with the class teacher and/or the Headteacher.

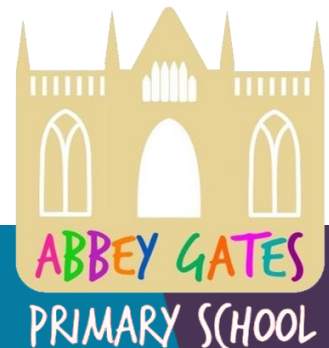

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Holiday Provision

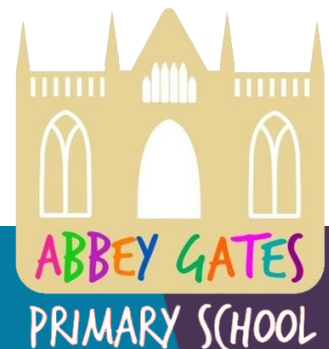
Abbey Gates offers holiday provision through ACE Sports Coaching.

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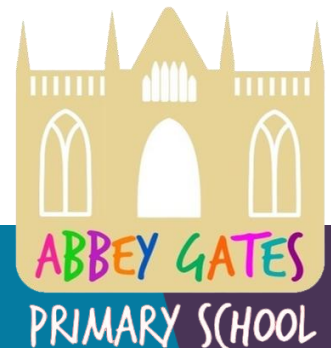
Going above and beyond

The school places considerable value on the activities it offers beyond the curriculum expectations, both through school initiatives and in supporting activities within the community. We have a Pupil Parliament through which elected representatives meet regularly and feedback information through assemblies. Recent initiatives have included Kindness Tokens and playtime games and activities. The Pupil Parliament also co-ordinates fundraising events for the numerous charities we support.

Extra-curricular activities may vary from term to term and year to year. Where possible we offer choir, art, drama, dance, multi-skills, cross country, gardening, football, basketball, cricket and yoga. Some of these are paid for by parents where there is an external provider.

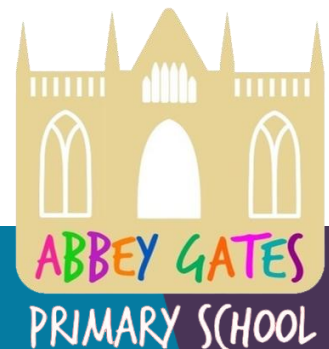
Going above and beyond

Sporting activities, particularly of a competitive team nature, encouraging participation, working together and leadership are fundamental to the school's breadth of educational experience. Cricket, cross-country running, swimming, football, basketball, tennis, multi-skills, netball, tag rugby, orienteering and athletics are available at certain times during the school year. Additionally, cycling safety is taught in the summer term.

Parents are always informed by letter about these activities, particularly since the majority are outside school hours when parents will be expected to arrange to collect/meet the children at the end of the sessions.

In addition, the school has established links with societies and other institutions within the community, such as the Parish Council, Ravenshead Rotary Club, St Peter's Church, the Library Service, local groups for the elderly, and childcare providers. A column in the village newsletter strengthens our links with the community.

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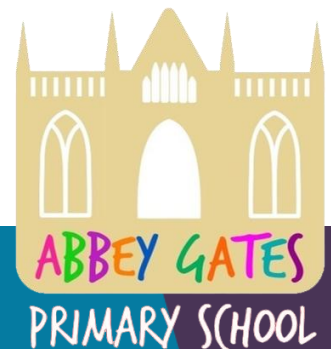
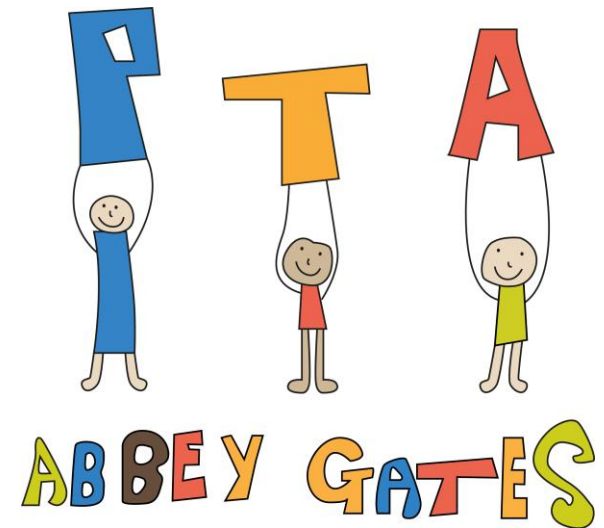
Parent Teacher Association

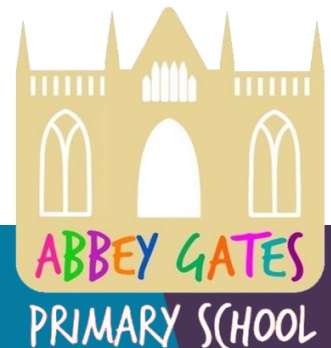
Travelling to and from school

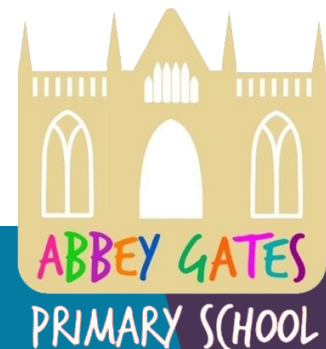

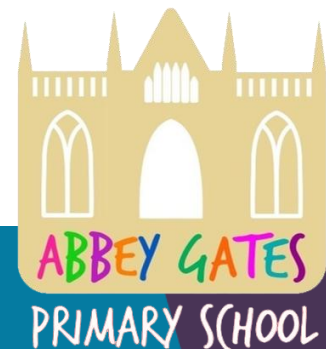

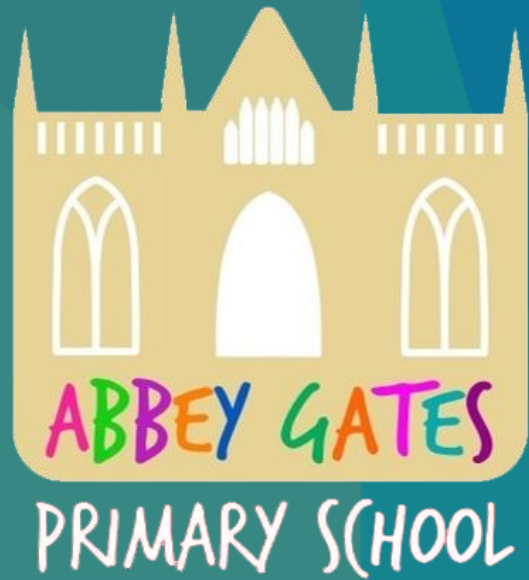
