Option 1 - Research

Find out about a place called Sutton Hoo and what was discovered there.

Option 2 - Open Ended Question



Answer the two key questions below:

- Why is it important to learn about the past?
- How do we know what happened in the past?

Challenge: You should write a full side of A4.

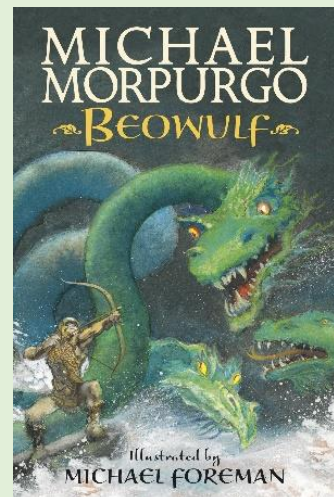
Option 3 - Illustrations
